

FVRC Speakers at the IRC Conference

Skin, Speech, and Surveillance: Dystopian YA Literature Through a Raciolinguistic Lens Jennifer Erickson

In this session Jennifer presents an analysis of five young adult dystopian fiction novels. The novels were published between 2008-2022, marketed to teens 13-17 years of age. Two novels were written by white female authors: Suzanne Collins' The Hunger Games (2008) and B.B. Brighton's Neverborn (2022). Three novels were written by female authors of color: Asian-American Marie Lu's Legend (2011), Indigenous-American Rebecca Roanhorse's Trail of Lightning (2018), and Mexican-American LGBTQ Tehlor Kay Meija's We Set the Dark on Fire (2019). In her presentation, Jennifer explores how a racially and religiously diverse sample of female authors depict characters of color, language, and surveillance and how you can share these novels in your classroom.





readers an empowering collection of biographies that encourages teens to embrace their complex identities.


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Set in 1975-a yea




Fox Valley Reading Council's Literacy Project Partnership with Love Smiles
