Fine line markers, pens and pencils work the best. Crayon is usually difficult to read. A white background provides a cleaner design.



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

Join educators from all over the state in the online Winter 2025 IRC Book Club! Choose one, two, or all three books!

Beginning January 19, participants will be reading, reflecting on, and responding in the *Humans Who Teach* book club, the *Rooted in Strength* book club, and/or the *Illinois Reads* book club during the seven-weeks of online discussions. Participants who complete all assignments will be eligible to receive 15 PD clock hours for each book club.

For the *Humans Who Teach: A Guide for Centering Love, Justice, and Liberation in Schools* book club, the book was written by Shamri Reid. This book club will be exploring the complicated humanity of those who teach and how within their humanity lies the transformative possibilities for cultivating lives and classrooms characterized by love. For the *Rooted in Strength: Using Translanguaging to Grow Multilingual Readers and Writers* book club, the book was written by Cecilia M. Espinosa and Laura Ascenzi-Moreno. This book club will be demonstrating how our emergent bilingual students who speak two or more languages in their daily lives thrive when they are able to use "translanguaging" to tap the power of their entire linguistic and sociocultural repertoires. For the *Illinois Reads* book club, participants will be selecting books from one of the age bands of the 2025 Illinois Reads list to prepare lesson plans and activities. For Birth to 2nd Grade, participants will select two books; for 3rd to 5th Grade, participants will select three books; for 6th to 8th Grade, participants will select two books; and for 9th to 12th Grade or the Adult age band, participants will select one book.

CONQUERING

September 4, 2024 ~ Peter H. Johnston Classroom Talk and Literacy Learning



The ways in which we talk with students and arrange for them to talk with each other have substantial effects on their literacy learning. This webinar examines the relationships among classroom talk, student engagement, and individual and collective student development. It shows how the classroom choices we make, particularly our language choices, influence the qualities of the classroom learning community along with students' literate, social and emotional development.

October 2, 2024 ~ Priten Shah AI in the Literacy Classroom: Friend or Foe?



Is Artificial Intelligence a revolutionary tool for literacy instruction or a threat to traditional teaching methods? This webinar explores the dilemma of AI in education. We'll examine how AI can enhance learning and save time and discuss concerns about over-reliance on technology and potential biases. Join us to critically assess AI's role in shaping the future of literacy education and decide: Is AI a valuable ally or a challenging adversary in our classrooms?

November 6, 2024 ~ Jan Hasbrouck Understanding, Assessing, and Teaching Our Students with Dyslexia



Dyslexia is a disorder with emotional, behavioral, and social impacts. Our understanding has deepened with new technologies being used by researchers to study the complex brain functions involved in reading and writing. While the IDA has developed a definition of dyslexia based on a convergence of reading science, there still is not universal agreement on how to define it. A number of myths and misunderstandings continue to persist regarding this neurobiological disorder which must be addressed and dispelled.





Some students seem to have the necessary skills they need to be good readers, yet still struggle with putting all of these things together in order to comprehend texts. In this session, we will look beyond these familiar skills to explore essential thinking skills, called executive skills, that support successful word reading and reading comprehension. Executive skills are self-regulatory skills that help students manage their thoughts emotions, actions, and involve things

their thoughts, emotions, actions, and involve things like working memory, self-control, and mental flexibility.

Calls for Contributions for Future Issues of the Illinois Reading Council Journal

The Illinois Reading Council Journal seeks manuscripts dealing with topics, issues, and events of interest to educators involved in literacy programs at all levels of education.

About The Review Process

The complete review process takes approximately 10 to 16 weeks. Upon receipt of a manuscript, an initial review will be conducted and feedback sent to the author. Manuscripts accepted for peer review will be evaluated by at least two reviewers who are uninformed as to the identity of the author. The editor will compile notes from the reviewers and send feedback to the author, including whether the article has been accepted for publication and any requests for revision. Manuscripts are evaluated in terms of interest, quality of writing, appropriate documentation of ideas, uniqueness, and needs of the journal. Research articles should include a clear description of the methodology and should be written in a style that will be readable by classroom teachers. The final decision for acceptance of manuscripts resides with the editor. Please review articles in the journal before submitting manuscripts for consideration. Any questions about the submission process should be directed to Roxanne Owens, IRCJ Editor, by e-mail at ircjournal@illinoisreadingcouncil.org.

Short Submissions

For each issue, short items such as original poems, cartoons, artwork, or personal anecdotes may appear throughout the journal. Such submissions should be one-half page to one page in length, double-spaced, and word-processed. Front and back cover art is also accepted. The editor selects these items. IRCJ Submission Guidelines

Article submissions should be eight to 25 double-spaced pages, including references. Please prepare and submit your manuscript consistent with the following guidelines.

- Anonymize the Manuscript Text: Remove any names or references to the author(s) and affiliated institutions (clearly marked placeholders may be employed, e.g., [Author Name]; [Name of Institution]).
- Text Formatting: In general, apply APA style guidelines (7th ed.) to your text (e.g., Times New Roman 12 point or a similar serif font, double spaced, 1-inch margins, etc.).
- File Type: Save the manuscript as a MS Word document .doc or docx. (MS Word is used to provide in-text comments and revisions, so please do not submit pdf., .pages or .rtf.)
- *File Name:* This should conform to the following format: article v1_{title of article}_mm-dd-yy

Example: article v1_Reading is essential_5-10-20

- Download the cover letter template from the submission webpage and fill it out.
- Rename the cover letter file name as follows: cover_{title of article}_mm-dd-yy
- Example: cover_Reading is essential_5-10-20

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
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
